“What’s Up at Inside Out?” — August PFLAG Meeting

Jessie Pocock will come to the August PFLAG meeting to provide an update on what’s happening at Inside/Out Youth Services. She has been the Executive Director of Inside/Out for the past six months, and has been rapidly building the program in the climate that her predecessor, Mary Malia, set up during her tenure.

Jessie is concentrating on health and wellness in the community of LGBTIQ youth, where substance abuse, smoking and suicide are significant issues. Inside/Out has received a three-year grant from the CU School of Health which will provide resources and training, as well as funding for three years from the statewide Office of Suicide Prevention and another three year commitment for development of a Trusted Adults program using state funds to help youth sidestep marijuana.

For the past fifteen years Jessie has worked in the nonprofit sector to ad-

vance the arts, social justice, and youth causes. As the executive director of the LEAD Foundation, she worked to empower students with learning disabilities to speak about their learning challenges to educators throughout the United States.

She was the development and events director for the University of Colorado, Colorado Springs (UCCS) Galleries of Contemporary Art, and spearheaded One Colorado’s Southern Colorado grassroots efforts for pro-LGBTQ equity legislation.

In 2016, she was appointed by Governor Hickenlooper to the Colorado Civil Rights Commission where she’s currently the vice chair. Jessie graduated from Colorado College where she earned her Bachelor in Sociology and continued to UCCS School of Public Affairs where she earned a Master of Public Administration degree. In 2014, Jessie was named a *Colorado Springs Business Journal* “Rising Star,” and the *Colorado Springs Independent* newspaper



Large Turnout for Colorado Springs PrideFest Reflects Community Support, Fear that Rights are Threatened

Colorado Springs' annual PrideFest celebrating the vibrancy of the LGBTQ community reveled in its usual flashy rainbow-hued hairdos and costumes along its downtown parade route Sunday, attracting a record number of spectators and participants, organizers said.

The large turnout under overcast skies, they said, reflected the growing confidence born of legal victories, such as the landmark 2015 Supreme Court ruling in favor of same-sex marriage, and concerns that civil rights are again threatened under the Trump administration, which has sought to ban transgender people from serving in the military.

Last month's narrow *Masterpiece Cakeshop* ruling, which left in place a Colorado baker's refusal to make a wedding cake for a gay couple based on his religious objections, has heightened fears about discrimination being condoned.

The theme for the city's 28th PrideFest was "Be ... you," a simple message that helped bring out crowds, said lead organizer Nic Grzecka, who took over (management of PrideFest) in 2015.

Since then the number of floats and other parade participants has grown from 18 to 57. This year there were more than 100 vendors, ranging from corporate sponsors' booths to food trucks.

"That is the most Colorado Springs PrideFest has ever had,"

Grzecka said.

While Grzecka credits volunteers for their hard work, the nation's heated political landscape also was a factor, he said.

"It is because of the current administration, that is why we are seeing record numbers," he said. "We are at a point where we are fighting again, re-visiting things that have already been fought before."

PFLAG congratulates Nic Grzecka of Club Q and all of his wonderful volunteers who created a powerful PrideFest celebration.

Transgender troops so far have remained in uniform as lawsuits on the issue grind through the courts.

The Pentagon, which took months to study the transgender ban, released guidelines in February that banned those who have undergone gender reassignment therapy. But the ban didn’t cover all transgender troops, and even the limited restrictions are being litigated.

“Among other things, the policies set forth by the secretary of defense state that transgender persons with a history or diagnosis of gender dysphoria — individuals who the policies state may require substantial medical treatment, including medications and surgery — are disqualified from military service except under certain limited circumstances,” Trump said in a March memo on the new policy.

The attempted reversal of the Obama-era policy that allowed transgender military service is an odd shift for a governmental entity that long has led the nation in civil rights reforms.

During World War II, the military allowed black pilots to earn their wings in what was seen as a major blow to Jim Crow policies. The Tuskegee Airmen’s success led to a 1948 decision that ended racial discrimination in the Defense Department.

In the 1970s, the military became a leader in the women’s rights movement. The first women were allowed entry into the nation’s service academies in 1976.

In the 1990s, the Pentagon adopted a policy of “don’t ask, don’t tell,” the first step toward allowing gays and lesbians to serve. In 2010, the Pentagon ended restrictions tied to homosexuality.

In 2016, the Pentagon approved transgender service and changed policies to allow women to serve in combat roles that had been male-only.

Transgender rights groups have filed suit against Trump, seeking to block the new ban. Court rulings in the matter could come later this summer.
