TYES Leader to Discuss Joys, Challenges of Parenting Gender Expansive Children

TYES (Trans Youth Education and Support), a program of PFLAG which is headquartered in Boulder, Colorado, will be the focus of the July 18th PFLAG meeting.

Shane Phairchyld, who leads the TYES group in Colorado Springs with Shelby Conques, will bring with him several guests who are LGBT advocates to discuss some of the issues faced by families with very young gender variant children. The term TYES uses to describe these children is "gender expansive".

Program topics include:


- A family's initial reaction to the gender expansive child. Parents in crisis.
- Finding medical and counseling resources. The importance of having affirming medical providers.
- Navigating the elementary school system. Advocating for a child with teachers and administrators.

- Homeschooling as an alternative.
- Legal issues that can arise with regard to gender expansive children and youth.

27th Annual PrideFest Celebration is July 8-9 at America the Beautiful Park



PrideFest is the official Colorado Springs LGBT Pride Festival, coming up on July 8-9 at America the Beautiful Park from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Adult admission is \$5. One sealed water bottle can be brought into the park, but no other outside beverages are permitted. Food for a picnic lunch can be brought into the park. Saturday is Family Day, with activities for children.

2017 marks the 27th annual PrideFest in Colorado Springs. Congratulations to Nic Grzecka of Club Q and his many supporters for continuing the PrideFest celebration each year after the Pride Center closed in January of 2015.

The theme of PrideFest 2017 is "L.ife G.ets B.etter T.ogether".

The parade route covers one mile, running north on Tejon to Colorado Avenue, then west on Colorado Avenue over the bridge to Cimino Drive and the park.

On Saturday, June 3rd, the Upper Arkansas Valley's first-ever Pride event was celebrated in Salida, Colorado. Less than three weeks earlier our chapter was contacted by Shannon Nelson, a Salida mom of a gay teenager, inviting our participation and asking guidance in forming their own local PFLAG chapter.

Is that awesome or what!

We immediately responded in support, and Cindy and Steve Waldmann and I went down to join in the Pride march and to help staff a busy booth in Riverside Park with our literature.

With key support from One-Colorado, Shannon is concurrently leading the effort to form a local gay-straight alliance (GSA) in the high school.

On short notice I was able to identify and list the local Methodist, Presbyterian and Episcopal churches as welcoming and affirming.

The "Ark Valley Pride" parade and picnic event was advertised in posters all over town and through social media. However, it was anyone's guess as to how many, or few, folks might show up to march. Imagine our surprise and delight that there were over

Our chapter is invested in helping our sister chapter form and grow, and they very much appreciate our experience and support. Shannon told me that their PFLAG steering committee wants their chapter to eventually be "just like the Colorado Springs Chapter."

Anti-Hate Billboard Campaign Targets Springs

(KOAA News June 14, 2017) A new anti-hate billboard went up on the south side of Colorado Springs this week. It says "Our families are stronger than your hate."

It's taking aim at conservative groups like Focus on the Family, the Family Research Council



and even the Westboro Baptist Church.

These are the same signs being put up in Washington D.C. and Topeka, Kansas, all by a national gay social network called "Hornet."

The company's President and Co-Founder Sean Howell says these unapologetic signs were brought to the Springs specifically to let Focus on the Family know that anti-LGBTQ stances will be resisted. "We wanted to really showcase that gay men are Americans too and that we are living our lives and building loving families," Howell said.

[Editor's Note: Rev. Nori Rost of All Souls Untarian Universalist Church was quoted in a Gazette story: "Hornet's assessment of the city is too harsh — and a few decades too late. I think that we have a reputation that isn't easily lost, but as someone who has lived here for 23 years as a queer person, I certainly have seen a lot of change."

Redesigned Pride Flag Recognizes LGBT People of Color

Philadelphia may be first city to symbolically recognize racism within the LGBTQ community.

When the Supreme Court made same-sex marriage legal nationwide two years ago, the White House was illumi-



nated with rainbow lights reminiscent of the pride flag to celebrate. See http://cnn.it/2tuC7XX

For Amber Hikes and many others in the LGBT community, the lights were a powerful symbol of a government's support for a marginalized community that had historically struggled to be recognized, much less openly supported.

Now Hikes, a black queer woman, is excited about a new gay-rights symbol: a pride flag with additional black and brown stripes above the rest of the rainbow. The stripes represent LGBT individuals of color, a group that can often be overlooked within the overall LGBT umbrella. "To see this at City Hall is such a profound statement" Hikes told CNN.
