

Fighting Online Bullying, One Emoji at a Time

When it comes to anti-bullying campaigns, Kortney Peagram has seen many: Wear this bracelet if you're not a bully, respond to something mean with something nice. They come and go like fads, she says.

Peagram is a psychologist who works with more than 30 schools in Illinois to help teachers and students deal with bullying and confrontational behavior — in other words, what most kids would call drama.

Much of it is now online, where mercurial, youthful emotions fly at double-speed.

"It happens so fast and it never stops," Peagram says. "Because of the invisible audience online, you think everybody saw that post and it basically becomes mass harassment. ... And when things are really bad, kids, they read all the comments over and over and they can't step away from it."

The collective digital community has struggled to catch up with cyberbullying — and how do you?

One in four teens told the Pew Research Center they frequently witness people "stirring up drama" on social media, in a <u>study released earlier this year</u>. And according to Pew's similar study from 2011, the most common response to mean behavior on social media is to ignore it.

The latest Apple iOS update includes a mysterious "eye-in-speech-bubble" emoji that has puzzled developers. The symbol is part of the Ad Council's new digital anti-bullying campaign, "I Am A Witness."

What's a good response when you don't really have something to say? $-\ (\ \)$

It was the developers picking apart Apple's latest iPhone operating system update who noticed it first: a new, weird emoji that looked like a cross between an eye and a speech bubble.

It's the <u>first-ever social awareness emoji</u>. Or, as Ad Council CEO Lisa Sherman describes it, a digital arm wrapped around a cyberbullying victim.

"When you think about it, the emoji gives teens a way to say something when they don't know what to say," she tells All Tech Considered.

The idea of the "I Am A Witness" campaign is to get the invisible bystanders to speak up against mean things on the Web. It comes wrapped in all kinds of social media packages: the emoji itself (one of a new batch with the new iOS update), a colorful website with more downloadables (including a special emoji keyboard + stickers), plus pushes on Twitter, Snapchat (ISeeBullying + geo tags + photo filter), Instagram (#IAmAWitness), YouTube and Facebook.

The Ad Council has tested the emoji with 30 boys and girls between the ages of 13 and 16 who do a lot of things online and had witnessed cyberbullying over the previous month. The organization tells All Tech that the teens said they were somewhat or very likely to use the emoji keyboard and generally liked the campaign. "Everyone is using emoji, so it may be a gateway to open up a new way of communication" about cyberbullying, Peagram says. "But we're not doing the preventive things, like how to be a good citizen online, or what not to post."

Organizers were very pleased with the turnout, including a significant number of new donors and potential volunteers. The event raised over \$36,000.

Transgender in Colorado— A Denver Post Series

The Denver Post has started a Transgender in Colorado series of articles chronicling people's experiences of being transgender. Recently, the series focused on the Kluzek family whose youngest child came out to them as transgender two years ago.

As thoughtfully detailed in the article, Erik, a conservative Lutheran, and Vicki, a Mormon, were stunned, to say the least. The article begins with noting the Kluzeks' previous belief that things like this only happened in ultra-liberal families, that transgender children were influenced by wayward parents. But a teenager's announcement that she is transgender sent her family on a journey of faith that resulted in a simple answer: unconditional love.

The Kluzeks discuss their own struggles with knowing without question they would support their child but not being clear what the right support would look like, as well as their internal conflict with their individual faiths. In the end, after watching the depth of their child's struggles and counseling with his pas-



tor, Erik "decided that the Christian approach was to love our daughter unconditionally, even though I didn't understand it."

The article illustrates the positive changes in Allison after she transitioned to a female, not only from her own point of view but as observed by her family. Erik and Vicki hope that their story will be helpful to other Conservative Christian families who need a way to move forward in supporting their LGBT family members, without feeling like they have to betray or in any way give up their faith to do so.

PFLAG Boulder County is proud to know the Kluzeks and so lucky to have the family working with us as we find ways to support LGBT individuals and their families. We are also grateful to The Denver Post for its poignant and thoughtful series.

Media Matters— Internet News Links from PFLAG National

Largest movement of Judaism in the U.S., passes most far-reaching resolution in support of transgender rights of any major religious organization. As a continuation of a tradition of inclusion in the Reform Jewish movement, on November 5th, members of the Union for Reform Judaism attending its biennial meeting in Orlando approved on a voice vote the resolution. It calls for several actions, including advocating on behalf of the transgender community.

California - California becomes first state to set process for inmate gender reassignment surgery, announced on October 22nd. California has instituted a new review process for transgender inmates seeking gender reassignment surgery. The California Correctional Health Care Services established the policy that sets a formal process for transgender people seeking taxpayer-funded gender reassignment surgery — a procedure endorsed by major medical and psychological organizations.

Texas - Houston's Proposition 1 (the HERO Ordinance) loses at ballot box on November 3rd. The referendum vote followed previous passage by Houston's City Council but placed on the ballot in this off-election year where it was defeated 61-39%.

Russia - Russian legislators introduce bill to ban public expression of homosexuality. On October 29th, a bill introduced in the Russian Duma by two members of the Russian Communist Party has critics saying that if passed, would effectively ban gay and lesbian people from coming out. Authorities would fine people who engage in "public expression of unconventional sexual relationships" and in some cases, would also spend 15 days in jail. The lawmakers say that the measure is "primarily aimed at" preventing "pedophilia in Russian society."
